Marin Transit for the Muir Woods Shuttle
Route 66F is a seasonal direct route to Muir Woods from Sausalito and Marin City which runs May 4th to October 27th, weekends and holidays only. **Route 66** departs solely from Mill Valley's Pohono Park & Ride. A \$5.00 per adult round-trip fare will be collected at the park entrance. marintransit.org (415) 526-3239

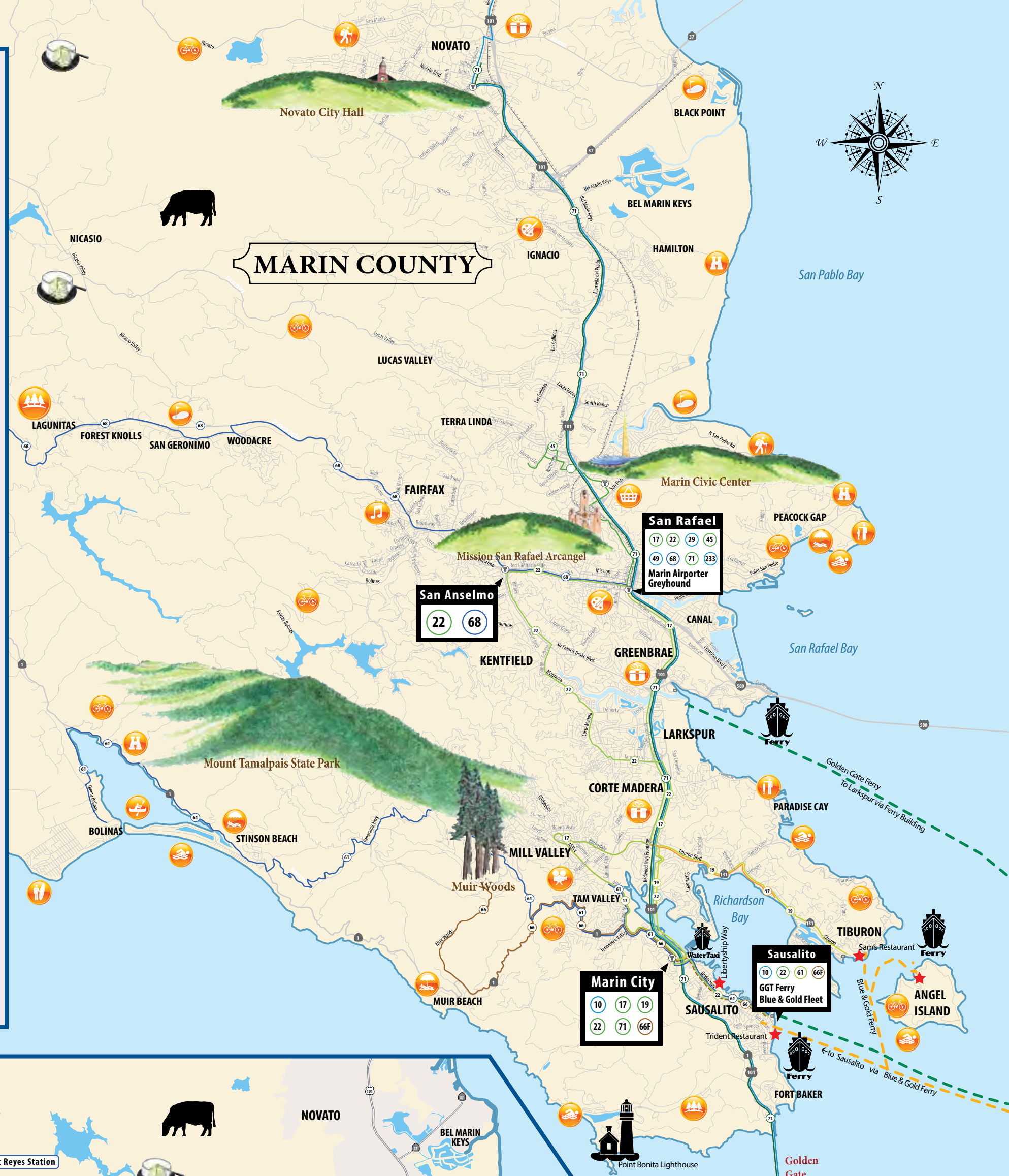
Muir Woods Shuttle

Tideline Water Taxi Service: This is San Francisco's first on-demand small passenger, all-weather taxi service. Carrying up to 12 passengers at a time, they are able to pick up and drop off from any of the designated points along the coast of Marin and San Francisco's piers. From San Francisco's Ferry Terminal to Sausalito:

From Sausalito to Muir Woods: On weekends and holidays only between May 4th and October 27th, one can get to Muir Woods from Sausalito's ferry terminal by taking the Muir Woods Shuttle **Route 66F** directly to the park via Marin City. As an alternate route for year-round travel, use the following adventurous route: From Bridgeway and Bay Street in Sausalito, take the Marin Transit bus #10 to Marin City and transfer to the **Route 61** West Marin Stagecoach. Disembark at Panoramic Highway and Bayview Drive for a one mile hike down to Muir Woods via the Dipsea Trail.
Trip duration - weekends: 1 hour/15 minutes
Trip duration - weekdays: 1 hour/30 minutes plus a 20 minute hike

To Stinson Beach: From Sausalito's ferry landing, walk four minutes to Bridgeway and Bay Street for the Marin Transit bus #10 to Marin City. Transfer to the West Marin Stagecoach **Route 61** bus towards Bolinas and disembark at the Stinson Beach parking lot.
Trip duration: 1 hour/30 minutes

To Point Reyes Station: Walk two minutes from ferry landing to Bridgeway and Bay Streets for Marin Transit bus #22 to the San Anselmo Hub. In San Anselmo, transfer to the **Route 68** West Marin Stagecoach towards Inverness and disembark in downtown Point Reyes at Shoreline Highway and 3rd Street.
Trip duration: 2 hours/45 minutes

From San Francisco's Ferry Terminal to Larkspur:

From Larkspur's Ferry Terminal to San Rafael's Mission Archangel: Walk three minutes to Sir Francis Drake Blvd. for Marin Transit bus #29 to the San Rafael Transit Center. Walk 13 minutes north on Tamalpais Avenue towards Fourth Street and turn left onto Fifth Avenue for the Mission located at 1104 Fifth Avenue. Bus #29 does not run on Sundays. Trip duration: 28 minutes

Visit the Civic Center and Lagoon: From Larkspur's Ferry Terminal, walk three minutes to Sir Francis Drake Blvd. for Marin Transit bus #29 to the San Rafael Transit Center. Transfer to either bus #45, #49, #233, or #259 north. Disembark at the Marin Civic Center Hall of Justice Arch. Bus #29 does not run on Sundays. Trip duration is 37 minutes

From San Francisco's Ferry Terminal & Pier 41 to Tiburon:

From Tiburon's Ferry Terminal to Mt Tamalpais SP: Walk two minutes to the corner of Tiburon Blvd. and Main Street for the #19 Marin Transit bus to Marin City. From Marin City at Donahue and Terners Streets, transfer to the **Route 61** West Marin Stagecoach towards Bolinas. Disembark at the Pantol Ranger Station on Mt. Tamalpais. Trip duration: 1 hour/30 minutes

To Point Reyes National Seashore: From Tiburon's ferry dock, walk two minutes to the corner of Tiburon Blvd. and Main Street for the #19 Marin Transit bus. Disembark at Strawberry Village (Reed Blvd. and Belvedere Dr.) and transfer to bus #17. After three stops, disembark at the San Rafael Transit Center. From there, the **Route 68** West Marin Stagecoach travels to the Bear Valley Visitor Center in Point Reyes and further to Inverness.
Trip duration: 2 hours/10 minutes

To Muir Woods: The shuttle runs on weekends and holidays only between May 4th and October 27th. Walk two minutes to the corner of Tiburon Blvd. and Main Street for Marin Transit bus #19. Disembark at Marin City (Donahue & Terners) and transfer to the Muir Woods Shuttle **Route 66F** bus.
Trip duration: 1 hour/40 minutes

Visit Angel Island: From Pier 41 in San Francisco, take the Blue and Gold Fleet directly to Angel Island. Round trip daily service is provided at a \$17.00 fare per adult. Tideline Water Taxi Service also provides an on-call service to Angel Island and other points of interest from seven different locations around the bay. Look for the Red Star locators on the map to plan your trip.

SAN ANSELMO

Adjacent Creek Park is perfect for picnics, and the site for outdoor movies during the town's warm, fog-free summer evenings. Millennium Playground in Memorial Park will keep youngsters busy.

The downtown streets are parking meter free and lined with restaurants, coffee houses, and bakeries. Spend a day exploring the many vintage and contemporary boutiques, and spas.

Exercise enthusiasts can hike or bike up the town's landmark 1,141-foot Bald Hill, which stands astride an unbroken swath of public open space stretching from the Golden Gate to the Point Reyes National Seashore.

With safe, friendly, walkable centers around a classic, century-old Carnegie library and Town Hall, San Anselmo is the all-american downtown!

SAN RAFAEL

San Rafael maintains its small town charm, with diverse dining, shopping and its' fantastic Mediterranean climate. When it's foggy in San Francisco, it is always sunny in San Rafael!

Take a stroll down tree lined Fourth Street, the downtown's business district. Come see where George Lucas filmed American Graffiti! Check out the dynamic nightlife with live music, world class multicultural restaurants and a wide variety of unique shops.

An international California Film Center boasts a beautifully restored, state-of-the-art, three-screen theater.

Explore the world famous Frank Lloyd Wright designed Civic Center on a Docent led tour. Visit one of California's historical landmark missions - the Mission San Rafael Archangel founded in 1822.

San Rafael is located just minutes north of the Golden Gate Bridge and directly connected to bus and ferry services, which offers easy transportation access.

The Art Commission sponsors concerts and comedy in the town plaza, and the Throckmorton Theater welcomes well-known music groups and performances.

WHAT THERE IS TO DO

Angel Island: Your day on Angel Island starts with a ferry ride! The island is rich with California history and perfect for a family outing, celebration, or “day away” from urban life.

Muir Woods National Monument
Ranger led tours of an ancient coast redwood forest. Plan on a minimum of two hours or hike out to Muir Beach for the day.

Mount Tamalpais State Park
Mountain biking was invented here! View a panorama of Marin County from this 2,571 foot peak. Features hiking trails from Bootjack and Pantol Ranger Stations, and a Mountain Theatre where outdoor Broadway musicals are presented each summer.

Corte Madera: Shopping at its best with two upscale malls: the Town Center and The Village. The best Fourth of July parade in Marin County is also well attended here each year.

San Rafael: Sidewalk cafes, historic building walking tours, and boutiques on and around Fourth Street. Visit the Mission Archangel on Fifth Street. Tour the Marin County Civic Center and lagoon, a Frank Lloyd Wright designed building. Wednesdays at 10:30 a.m.

Novato: One-stop shopping at the Vintage Oaks Shopping Center with over 50 merchants in one place; then explore old town Novato located along Grant Avenue for antiques and unusual gifts.

Point Reyes National Seashore
Visit Bear Valley Visitor Center to hike the Earthquake Trail. Test your horseback riding skills on seashore trails. View the migrating salmon in Olema Creek during winter months, and mating elephant seals at Chimney Rock. In spring, there are spectacular wildflower displays along coastal spots.

Point Reyes Station: You'll find a little bit of everything here. From cheese tastings, farm-to-fork dining, and local oysters to book shops, art galleries, clothing stores, and specialty businesses that feature local products.
